WINNERS OF THE 14th UNWTO AWARDS FOR INNOVATION IN SUSTAINABLE TOURISM

The World Tourism Organization UNWTO announced the <u>winners for the</u> <u>14th Edition of the UNWTO Awards for</u> innovation in Sustainable Tourism.

Fourteen innovative projects among 128 applicants from 55 countries have been selected as finalists of the 14th UNWTO Awards for Innovation in Tourism.

The UNWTO Awards Ceremony was celebrated in collaboration with Madrid International Tourism Fair (FITUR-IFEMA) on January 17th. The Ceremony has been preceded by the UNWTO Awards Forum (15 January 2018) where finalists presented their respective projects and share their expertise. The Forum showcased the outstanding achievements, serving as a platform to share the most innovative and inspiring trends of the tourism sector.
